

# LOGISTICS CLUSTER – LIBYA

## OPERATIONAL OVERVIEW



### Logistics Coordination

Regular logistics coordination meetings take place in Cairo, Zarzis and Benghazi. 39 coordination meetings have taken place since the 8th March.

### Information Sharing

Relevant logistics information products, including maps, are made available through the Logistics Cluster website and a moderated mailing list. This includes information on logistics infrastructure such as ports, airports, roads, customs, and suppliers covering Egypt, Libya, Tunisia and Malta.

### U.N. Humanitarian Air Services (UNHAS)

At the request of the Humanitarian Coordinator, on 1 May WFP launched a regional UNHAS flight service. Flight routes servicing Malta – Benghazi – Cairo and Malta – Djerba – Benghazi - Cairo. Further details about accessing these services, along with the revised schedule, are available at: <http://www.logcluster.org/ops/lby11a/unhas-schedule-and-forms>. 1,474 passengers from 155 entities have been transported so far.

### Sea Transport

The Logistics Cluster provides free-to-user sea transport for interagency goods on available and/or chartered ships to Libyan ports of Benghazi and



Misrata. Organizations are informed prior to every sailing and invited to submit a SRF (Service Request Form) for transport. As of 1<sup>st</sup> July, the Logistics Cluster is providing passenger and cargo transport service between Benghazi and Misrata, via the WFP-chartered ship MV FEHIM BEY. Overall, more than 2800 m<sup>3</sup> of cargo has been transported for 21 organizations on available/chartered ships by sea at no cost to users.

### Road Transport

The Logistics Cluster has been facilitating the delivery of relief cargo by offering trucking services from Cairo /Alexandria into Benghazi to the humanitarian community on a cost recovery basis. This service has now been extended to serve locations within eastern Libya. 1,278 m<sup>3</sup> of cargo has been transported by road for ten organizations far.

### Storage

A free storage service has been made available to humanitarian organizations at the 20,000 m<sup>2</sup> WFP warehouse in Ganfuda, Benghazi. Some limited interagency storage can also be provided in Tunisia at WFP warehouses on request. 2,060 m<sup>3</sup> of cargo has been stored for nine organizations.

### Geographical Information Systems

The Logistics Cluster maintains a GIS capability in order to provide logistics maps, as well as to coordinate with OCHA on the development of maps specific to the crisis. The following maps have been published and are available in hard copy on request:
