

Situation Update

- The death toll from the recent earthquake and tsunami in Central Sulawesi now stands at 2,045, according to the latest press briefing from the National Disaster Management Agency, BNPB. A further 82,775 people have been displaced and 10,679 people have been injured, while 671 are still missing.
- Based on the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) letter D/01853/10/10/2018/16, current needs open to international assistance are as follows:
 - Air assets capable of landing on a short runway (2 km airstrip)
 - Family tents and shelter kits
 - Water treatment kits
 - Generator sets
 - Financial donations (preferably directed to BNPB and the Indonesian Red Cross (PMI))

- The state of emergency has been extended until 25 October 2018.

AIRPORTS

Balikpapan Airport

- The Balikpapan airbridge has been extended for an additional two weeks until 25 October.
- Indonesian Military Forces (TNI) are coordinating all Foreign Military Assets (FMAs) utilising Balikpapan Airport through bilateral meetings with countries that have been cleared to assist by the Government.

- A Civil-Military coordination structure will be set up in Balikpapan to ensure efficient coordination.
- Organisations wanting to send their aid through Balikpapan need to obtain a [flight clearance](#) from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) in addition to the usual documentation.
- Approximately 82 mt of relief items were transported by air from Balikpapan to Palu today.
- There are nine flights planned from Balikpapan to Palu on 12 October, transporting approximately 100 mt of relief cargo.

Palu Airport

- There is currently cargo congestion at Palu airport due to a lack of consignee details on transported relief items. With the Mobile Storage Units (MSUs) now set up at the airport, this congestion is expected to ease shortly.
- DHL is currently operating three trucks at the airport. WFP is exploring the possibility of mobilising additional trucks to support the response.

STORAGE

- Two AHA MSUs have been erected at Palu airport and AHA is managing them.
- A warehouse has been identified at the seaport and WFP is working with the seaport authority and operators to secure approximately 500 m² of the facility to be used as common storage.
