


WFP food imports in mt

The chart represents WFP food imports for its programmes in Yemen, and it includes food commodities imported through commercial vessels as well as chartered vessels for humanitarian cargo.



WFP Fuel Imports

The chart represents the diesel imports for the revolving fuel stock project implemented by WFP Bilateral Service Provision (BSP) in Yemen. The project aims to ensure an uninterrupted supply of fuel to critical health facilities and local water corporations on behalf of WHO and UNICEF, thus ensuring the continuation of critical services for the population of Yemen.




Sea cargo transport in m³ facilitated by the Logistics Cluster

The Logistics Cluster facilitates the cargo transport via sea on board the WFP-chartered vessels VOS Apollo and VOS Theia. VOS Apollo operates a weekly rotation between Djibouti and Aden, whereas VOS Theia travels on average three times a month between Djibouti and Hodeidah; both vessels can be used as staff evacuation means.

However in September, only one VOS Apollo voyage (#122) was carried out the first week of September carrying only passengers. The remaining voyages, including the VOS Theia voyages, had to be cancelled. The VOS service is now on hold until further notice; any urgent cargo shipment to Yemen may be arranged by dhow.




Air deliveries in m³ facilitated by the Logistics Cluster

The Logistics Cluster facilitates combined chartered airlifts from Djibouti to Sana'a, on a frequency contingent on needs and funding.

In September, the Logistics Cluster facilitated the transport of 109 mt / 537 m³ of relief items on behalf of IOM, UNICEF and WHO. Of these, 65 mt / 358 m³ were transported to throughout for rotations from 10 to 13 September; the remaining 48 mt / 179 m³ were transported through three rotations on 24, 26 and 27 September.
