

Situation Overview and access constraints

Situation overview

- The 2016 Humanitarian Needs Overview has been released. Here following the main findings:
 - 21.2 million people (82 percent of the population) are in need of humanitarian assistance;
 - 14.4 million people are food insecure;
 - 19.3 million people lack adequate access to clean water or sanitation.
- In response to the cyclones, the Logistics Cluster continues to facilitate humanitarian assistance namely:
 - **Air transport:** four airlifts to Socotra Island are planned to take place this week. On behalf of WHO, 4.1 mt and 19 m³ of health items are planned to be moved from Djibouti to Socotra. On behalf of IOM, with 48.1 mt and 173 m³ of shelter, protection and WASH items planned from Nairobi to Socotra through Djibouti.
 - **Road transport:** as of 23 November, 27 trucks reached Shabwa, Mukalla and Mahara. Additional three trucks, on behalf of UNHCR and WHO, did not reach final destinations due to insecurity on the way and delays in receiving security clearances.
 - **Sea transport:** One vessel from Djibouti reached Aden on 16 November, with 18 mt of medical supplies for WHO.

Access constraints

Road

- The main challenges faced in the overland transport continue to be bad road conditions and delays in receiving security clearances.
- Taizz is accessible, from Aden via the Turbah road, but with difficulties.

Air

Socotra Airport is functional.

Djibouti in-transit customs facilitation, storage and sea transport

- The **MV MAINPORT CEDAR** returned from Aden to Djibouti on 17 November. For the next voyage, the Logistics Cluster plans to load 161 m³ of humanitarian supplies on behalf of IOM.
- The **MV AMSTERDAM** arrived in Djibouti from Hodeidah on 12 November. The Logistics Cluster is working on the loading plan for the next rotation (Aden and Hodeidah).

Yemen storage and overland transport

- The Logistics Cluster is facilitating overland transport to Taizz, on behalf of:

- FAO: 37 mt and 1.715 m³ of agricultural items from Sana'a;
 - UNFPA of 2 mt and 1 m³ of health items from Sana'a;
 - UNICEF 3.1 mt and 1256 m³ wash and health items from Aden.
- As of 23 November, no trucks has reached Taizz. FAO and UNFPA trucks left Sana'a on 22 November and are on the road. UNICEF trucks returned back to Aden due to security incidents encountered on the road.

Fuel Provision

- During October, a total of 233,803 litres of fuel were distributed to 28 humanitarian organisations: 88,233 in Sana, 105,211 in Hodeidah, 40,359 in Aden.
- Since May 2015, a total of 2,492,833 litres of fuel have been distributed by the Logistics Cluster to 60 organisations.

Air Transport

- The Logistics Cluster together with WFP Aviation is facilitating two cargo airlifts to Socotra: One on behalf of IOM will depart from Nairobi, the other, on behalf of WHO, will depart from Djibouti.

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
