Bilateral meeting next week (virtual) with the Ministry of Industry (Mol) regarding increasing the domestic production and support needed from the logistics team.2. Logistics team will compile data on health assistance (organization, type of assistance provided, total, partners, etc.)3. Next Logistics coordination meeting: Friday, 10 April 2020 at 15:00 WIB.

1. Updates

- a. BNPB has appointed the International airport of Soekarno Hatta and Halim Perdanakusuma as the entry points;
- b. A warehouse in Halim has been officially appointed as the main warehouse (Garuda Warehouse) to receive International goods belongs to COVID-19 Task Force, BNPB and ministries/institutions (excluding private sectors, foundation/NGOs/International NGOs, individu);
- c. The logistics information system is currently managed by the national team; the system was developed by Mr. Arya Sinulingga from Ministry of State Owned Enterprises (SOE), and operated by Logistics & Equipment team, BNPB.
- d. BNPB logistics team collaborates with BNPB Data Centre to compile all the information on regulation, suppliers, etc. into a more accessible platform for public;
- e. ALFI is providing customs services (pro bono) for COVID-19 Task Force, including BNPB and line ministries;
- f. ALFI fleet consist of 4 trucks are on standby in Tanjung Priok and for shunting purpose between the entry points (Halim Perdanakusuma and Soekarno Hatta airport);
- g. ALFI has total 30 casual workers, 13 are based in Halim (the main warehouse). Mr. Nelwan Harahap (Coordinating Ministry for Human Development & Culture, CMHDC) coordinates and collaborates with PT Pos Indonesia, Ministry of Health, BNPB Logistics and Ministry of Social Affairs on distributions.
- h. Procurement and distribution: the discussion on 30 March 2020 with the CMHDC, Mol and Ministry of Social Affairs or MoSA (Annex 1).

2. Supply

- a. BNPB has received more than 400 import requests. The process of requests is focusing on medical equipment supplies;
- b. The non-medical items belong to ministries (e.g. psychosocial support activities): see note no. 3 below. Further, Hope Worldwide International is ready to facilitate to distribute the items.
- c. Local or domestic production: need a bilateral discussion with tlhe Mol.

3. Customs

- Logistics team organized a strategic logistics discussion between BNPB (cross-directorate), Directorate General of Customs and Excise, ALFI, and PPK (company handles customs services). The follow-up are:
 - a. based on the Customs and Excise infographics (annex 2), ALFI will develop a simple SOP. Prior dissemination the draft SOP will be finalized and approved by BNPB (Law & Cooperation Bureau);
 - b. Legal Bureau emphasized on the prioritization to receive medical items. Suggested that under the coordination with BNPB (supporting post in the entry points), each ministry should appoint its PPK for non-medical items clearance.
- ALFI has disseminated the list of active PPKs. The same list will be disseminated through the National Logistics Cluster WAG.

4. Incoming Goods

In the pipeline:

- a. UNDP-WHO : 30 unit ventilators. 15 unit will arrive in April and another 15 units in May.
- b. Project HOPE : 2,500 goggles from the USA and 40,000 N95 masks from China.
- c. Hope Indonesia Foundation will import surgical masks from China.

5. Update from the MoH

6. Discussions

- Main warehouses are still concentrated in Jakarta. Suggest to appoint additional warehouse outside Jakarta to expedite the distributions;
- Is it allowed for international NGOs to import medical items from overseas?
 - Yes is allowed. Referring to the government mechanism (Annex 2: Customs and Excises procedures and Annex 3: BNPB). The distributions and or program implementation in the country should be done by local NGOs.
- Is the existing PPE supplies sufficient? what is the mechanism and procedures for NGO to support?
 - Referring to the meeting on 25 March 2020; the PPE requirements is tremendous (Annex 4). The current supplier (import and local) are inadequate. The MoI is now focusing to increase domestic production.
 - One of the requirements to produce PPEs in country is a distribution license (issued by MoH). This is to ensure the quality of products are according to standard.
- The license should be made online.
- Logistics discussion are divided into three categories:
 - availability of supply
 - distribution
 - sub-national requirements

- The quality of imported rapid test should be properly check and confirm.
- Logistics team need to identify organization who provides assistance related to medical supply.
- Supports provided should also consider the vulnerable groups including people with speech and hearing impairment.
